Re: New Polling Data on Guns and Crime in Pennsylvania

A new poll of likely 2008 voters in Pennsylvania conducted by Lake Research Partners ${ }^{1}$ shows that Pennsylvania voters overwhelmingly support tougher laws to control the availability of guns and reduce gun crime. Support for tougher gun laws cuts across regional and party lines-with many tough measures supported by gun owners as well.

## KEY FINDINGS—GUN CONTROL MEASURES

- Almost eight out of ten voters ( $77 \%$ ) support a statewide ban on assault weapons, including $69 \%$ who strongly favor a ban, while $22 \%$ are opposed ( $16 \%$ strongly). Eighty-nine percent of women and $64 \%$ of men favor a statewide assault weapons ban. Almost two-thirds of gun owners ( $\mathbf{6 2 \%}$ ) favor this ban with just $\mathbf{3 7 \%}$ opposed.
- Over two thirds of Republicans ( $\mathbf{7 1 \%}$ ) favor a ban-especially Republican women ( $\mathbf{8 4 \%}$ ). Democrats ( $84 \%$ favor) are the most intense supporters, but independents ( $73 \%$ favor) also favor a ban.
- More than two-thirds of voters ( $\mathbf{7 1 \%}$ ) support a statewide limit on handgun purchases to one gun a month, including $54 \%$ strongly. Even $61 \%$ of gun owners support this limit. This limit also has appeal across the state, with $72 \%$ of those living in urban areas, $75 \%$ of those living in the suburbs, and $66 \%$ of those living in rural communities supporting the one gun a month limit.
- Arguments that cracking down on illegal guns would take away the rights of gun owners do not hold water with voters. Over two thirds of these voters ( $70 \%$ ) agree with a statement that "Cracking down on illegal guns, gun runners, and violent criminals who use stolen guns in their crimes is good for everyone in the state, including law-abiding gun owners." Just $27 \%$ agree with an opposing

[^0]statement that "Any time a politician talks about cracking down on guns, their end goal is to take away the rights of gun owners."

## KEY FINDINGS-GUN SAFETY MEASURES

- Pennsylvania voters overwhelmingly support a number of additional gun safety measures, including:
, Requiring all police departments in Pennsylvania to trace and report any firearm recovered from a juvenile under 18 who was illegally in possession of the firearm ( $93 \%$ favor, $6 \%$ oppose).
, Require usage of trigger locks or locked boxes on premises where children are present (85\% favor, 14\% oppose).
, Requiring gun owners to report lost or stolen or face a fine for unintentional failure to report, or a criminal charge for intentional failure to report ( $81 \%$ favor, $19 \%$ oppose).
- Each of these three measures is supported by at least $70 \%$ of gun owners and over three-fourths of voters across party lines.


## KEY FINDINGS-OVE RALL VIEWS ON GUNS AND CRIME

- Voters across Pennsylvania want to take action to reduce gun crime in the state's large cities. Almost three out of four believe ( $72 \%$ agree, $61 \%$ strongly $)^{2}$ that: "If we really want to reduce crime and gun violence in Pennsylvania's large cities, the whole state has to work together."
- For these voters, crime is not just an isolated issue, but an important piece of the state's well-being and health. Over eight in ten voters ( $82 \%$ ) say the problem of crime and gun violence is important to the overall health and well-being of the state.
